

## HARRY JONES NEW PLAQUE INSTALLED ON HEADSTONE

Don't know why any reasonable person would want my old plaque; I think there were only a few cents of value in the brass....they may have thought it was gold!

## CARIBOO'S GRAND OLD MAN CROSSES DIVIDE

### From Cariboo Observer newspaper February 29, 1936

Harry Jones, whose death occurred in Vancouver Sunday morning, was one of Cariboo's outstanding pioneers. He came to Cariboo in the summer of 1863 with a company of 27 Welshmen headed by the late "Captain" John Evans to mine gold on Lightning Creek. He was in his  $23^{rd}$  year at the time. Talisien Evans, son of the leader, and Harry were the two youngest members of the "Adventurers" company. To distinguish Harry Jones from eight other Jones in the party, he was known as "Henry VIII." All of the men in the company were given a number.

The Adventurers broke up in the fall of 1864 and about half of them returned to Wales. Some scattered to other parts of the Province and a few remained in Cariboo.

Harry Jones hiked out to the coast in the fall of 1884 and returned to Barkerville early in the following spring. One of his first jobs was in the famous Ericcson claim on Conklin's gulch. In a few years, working under some of the ablest deep diggings men in the country, he became an expert, face man himself. One of his outstanding accomplishments was the Van Winkle drain tunnel in the early 1870's which not only brought wealth to the Van Winkle shareholders but to the owners of three adjoining claims as well. Driven out by water, the crews of the Victoria, Vancouver and Vulcan stood by until the drain tunnel tapped the Van Winkle shaft. The tunnel then acted as a drain for all four claims.


When the best miners in Cariboo failed, Harry Jones took on the job and drove his tunnel through slum by reversing the accepted methods of timbering.

Mr. Jones went home to Wales in the winter of 1875-78 and returned again in the summer of 1888 and 1899 when he accepted a position at Wingdam where he had charge of shaft operations for quite a long period.

In 1903 he was elected as one of Cariboo's members in the Provincial Legislature at Victoria, and was returned in the elections of 1906. He was defeated three years later. For several years, from 1920 to 1926, he acted in the capacity of caretaker at Wingdam at that time and the fall of 1933, when he left for Vancouver to reside with a nephew, J.H.

Roberts, he was interested in placer ground at Beaver Pass and on Lovett Creek.

Possessed of a remarkable memory he was able to recall in interesting detail many events of the early days in Cariboo. When word was received here late Sunday that the end had come, friends wired Mr. Roberts and also Premier Pattullo suggesting that the body of Harry Jones be brought back to Cariboo for burial. The



cemetery at Stanley was recommended because it is there that Capt. John Evan's is buried. Robert Pritchard, another member of the Adventurers is taking his last rest in the same cemetery as well as the remains of two of Harry Jones partners in the "Vanwinkle", Henry Lindhard and Josiah Beedy. Among other well-known Cariboo miners buried there are Wm. Wormald, John Peebles and Abe Stott.

While the appearance of this cemetery has been more or less neglected in late years, it is understood that a movement has been started to have it fenced and otherwise made more presentable.

The body arrived on yesterday's PGE train and the funeral procession leaves here for Stanley at 12 noon Saturday for burial at 2:45 the same afternoon. Brief stops will be made at Cottonwood House and at Wingdam where other cars will join the procession. Rev. Boothroyd of Wells will conduct the services at Stanley in the Mattison building opposite the old Wormald Hotel and at the graveside.

#### MISSING HEADSTONE MARKER REPLACED WITH NEW

John Mitchell visited the Stanley cemetery two years ago and noticed that Harry's headstone had no marker and decided then he would try raising some money to put in place a new marker for Harry's headstone. Unfortunately the original went missing many years ago.

Recently, John completed this task with the help of Friends of Barkerville members.




Many thanks to everyone who helped on the replacement of the new sign at Stanley which tells some history of Stanley with photos as well as a good display of flora and fauna.

#### STANLEY CEMETERY UPDATE

The Friends have been very busy lately with a few projects on the go. The Stanley cemetery is coming along nicely having been made wheelchair accessible a few years back, fixing fences after snowfall damage and picket fences around the graves. Next big job is getting new headboards made to replace the old ones that are barely readable and some are just falling apart.

The new sign across from the cemetery was another project that is now

complete except for a bit of maintenance yet to fasten it down more securely. Future plans are to install a kiosk which will have some history on the people in the graveyard. So there is work yet to be done at Stanley.



It seems a shame that the highway bypasses this historic site and old graveyard. The Friends did request to have a sign installed at each road entrance and this has been done by highways. Hopefully people will take a moment to detour off the highway and make that circle around for a visit.

We are in the stages of updating signage for the historic trails and hope to do some cleanup on them. We have many great historic trails around Barkerville for the hiker to use. Volunteer help is always in need!
